U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) Exceeds Goal, Housing Nearly 48,000 Veterans Experiencing Homelessness

The VA announced it housed 47,925 veterans experiencing homelessness in fiscal year (FY) 2024, exceeding its target of 41,000 by nearly 17 percent, marking the highest number housed in a year since 2019. Notably, 96 percent of these veterans did not return to homelessness. Since FY22, the VA has permanently housed close to 134,000 veterans, contributing to a 4 percent reduction in U.S. veteran homelessness since 2020 and a 52 percent decrease since 2010. In Los Angeles, where the VA achieved a 15.5 percent regional goal surplus, the homeless veteran population fell by nearly 23 percent. Following a "Housing First" approach, the VA continues to prioritize stable housing and comprehensive support services to eliminate veteran homelessness nationwide.

Outshining Internal Candidates: Strategies for Veterans and Spouses in Job Interviews

Competing with internal candidates can feel daunting, especially for veterans and spouses, as internal candidates often have established relationships, familiarity with the team, and industry experience.

Although internal candidates secure roles in 60 percent of cases, external candidates still have a chance to stand out by leveraging their unique experiences and demonstrating exceptional preparation. Strategies to succeed include: preparing thoroughly to highlight skills, showing fresh ideas, asking insightful questions, and utilizing networking. Even if the internal candidate is selected, strong impressions can lead to future opportunities, especially if recruiters view external candidates as promising talent for other roles.

Documentary About Platoon's Journey Through Battle and Healing

<u>Shadows of Fallujah</u> is a powerful 25-minute documentary that captures the harrowing experiences of a platoon during Operation Phantom Fury, using a blend of firsthand accounts from soldiers and archival BBC footage of their battalion in action. This film, co-produced by TJ Cooney, revisits the intense 2004 battle in Fallujah, detailing the physical and emotional scars that these veterans continue to bear. Part of a broader, month-long multimedia series commemorating the battle's 20th anniversary, *Shadows of Fallujah* reflects both the immediate impact of combat and the ongoing struggle for healing two decades later.

VA Sets Record for Veteran Care and Benefits in 2024

In FY24, the VA achieved <u>record levels of service delivery</u>, providing more health care and benefits to veterans than ever before. Under the Biden-Harris Administration's Unity Agenda and the expanded benefits of the Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics (PACT) Act, the VA saw a 6 percent increase in health care appointments, processed a record \$187 billion in benefits, and achieved an 80.4 percent trust rating from veterans. The VA expanded outreach for disability claims and health care, housed nearly 48,000 homeless veterans, and enhanced support for women veterans, caregivers, and crisis intervention services. Notable achievements include processing record numbers of dental procedures, life insurance coverage, home loans, and commemorative pages in the Veterans Legacy Memorial. Moving forward, the VA aims to build on these gains, improving access and engagement to ensure all veterans receive the care and benefits they deserve.



Honorable Discharges Granted to Some Ousted by 'Don't Ask, Don't Tell' (DADT)

In The Pentagon announced that hundreds of veterans discharged under the DADT policy have had their less-than-honorable discharges <u>upgraded to honorable status</u>, granting them access to long-denied benefits such as health care, pensions, and education. The DADT policy, in effect from 1994 to 2011, forced more than 13,000 LGBTQ+ service members out of the military, with nearly 2,000 receiving discharges that deprived them of key veterans' benefits.

While this move is seen as a significant step toward righting past wrongs, advocates stress that more work is needed to fully address the harm done to LGBTQ+ veterans. The Defense Department emphasized its commitment to inclusion, though many call for further reparative efforts.



Service-Connected Disabilities Among U.S. Veterans Doubles Over Past 14 Years

JA new U.S. Census Bureau report reveals that the percentage of veterans with service-connected disabilities has doubled, rising from 15 percent in 2008 to 30 percent in 2022. The report, titled Trends in Veteran Disability Status and Service-Connected
Disability: 2008–2022, examines disability rates among veterans, especially focusing on post-9/11 veterans, who are the youngest group and have been the focus of recent health research. It draws on data from American Community Survey (ACS) estimates between 2008-2019 and 2021-2022, highlighting notable increases in service-connected disability rates among veterans compared to the broader nonveteran population.

EVENTS

Upcoming Stand Down (SD) Events

SDs are typically one- to three-day events providing supplies and services to veterans experiencing homelessness, such as food, shelter, clothing, health screenings, and VA Social Security benefits counseling. Veterans can also receive referrals to other assistance such as health care, housing solutions, employment, substance use treatment, and mental health counseling. They are collaborative events, coordinated between local VA Medical Centers, the U.S. Department of Labor (DOL), other government agencies, and community-based homeless service providers.

This non-competitive grant is awarded on a first-come, first-served basis to support one-day or multi-day events at up to \$7,000 or \$10,000, respectively.

Eligible entities include:

- state workforce agencies
- state and local workforce investment boards
- veterans service organizations
- local public agencies and nonprofit organizations, including community and faith-based organizations
