

Homeless Veterans' Reintegration Program (HVRP) Information Session: Wednesday, August 20, 2025

Questions and Answers (Q&A)

Overview

The following Q&A document provides responses to questions posed at the HVRP Information Session intended for organizations serving homeless women veterans and homeless veterans with children on August 20, 2025. Questions have been synthesized for clarity.

Q&A

Q1: I am a military spouse who offers financial training to veterans and their spouses. How do I collaborate with others to offer this training?

A1: If you are interested in collaborating with your local HVRP, you can identify an active HVRP grant recipient near you using the [Active HVRP Grants Map](#). There are also press releases from the U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) with information on [new grants awarded in Program Year \(PY\) 2025](#) and [grants awarded in previous PYs receiving continued funding in PY 2025](#).

However, please note that HVRP provides services to veterans experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness. HVRP grant recipients cannot provide services to military spouses.

Q2: There is no saturation in Wyoming currently. Does that mean that there is no opportunity for us to be provided with funding to assist veterans in the state?

A2: There is no saturation level for Wyoming because Wyoming currently does not have any HVRP grants servicing the state. In the PY25 FOA, WY-500 Wyoming Statewide Continuum of Care (CoC) (the state's sole CoC) could support up to 37 planned enrollments per the most recent HUD PIT count.

Q3: If I apply for HVRP funding but we do not end up having many veterans enter our shelter, is that a problem?

A3: Applicants should not rely solely on a particular shelter for enrollments but should have a robust outreach plan, such as partnerships with local CoCs, local American Job Centers (AJC), VA housing programs, and their state's Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to find eligible veteran enrollments. Applicants for HVRP funding must establish goals for several performance indicators, including the number of participants enrolled. Applicants must ensure performance goals are realistic, programmatically aligned, and supported by sound methods and strategies for accomplishing goals. Awardees will be held to the performance goals submitted in their application and must report quarterly on the progress toward their cumulative goals throughout the three-year period of performance (PoP). DOL/VETS may impose specific conditions, in accordance with [2 C.F.R. § 200.208](#), for failure to meet performance goals. Failure to achieve performance goals may also have a significant impact on future federal awards and/or the ability to receive future federal awards. Applicants must also describe how they determined the proposed project is needed in each SDA and include evidence that supports the nature and extent of the need and why the proposed SDA(s) will benefit from HVRP services.

Q4: Is there an organization providing services in New Mexico? If so, are there any eligibility restrictions based on a veteran's citizenship status?

A4: Yes, there is an HVRP grant recipient serving New Mexico. Goodwill Industries of New Mexico serves Bernalillo, Chaves, Curry, Eddy, Lea, McKinley, Roosevelt, San Juan, Sandoval, Santa Fe, Torrance, and Valencia counties.
