

## Homeless Veterans' Reintegration Program (HVRP) Information Session: Wednesday, July 8, 2026

### Questions and Answers (Q&A)

#### Overview

The following Q&A document provides responses to questions posed at the HVRP Information Session intended for U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) Grant Programs and housing and homelessness service providers on July 8, 2026. Questions have been synthesized for clarity.

#### Q&A

**Q1: Is there a monetary limit on assistance provided per veteran enrolled in HVRP?**

A1: Participant support costs support the reintegration of enrolled HVRP participants back into the labor force. There is no specific monetary limit on this assistance provided per veteran enrolled in HVRP; however, each grant recipient has set costs per placement/enrollment goals that do provide a target for the amount spent per participant. Grant recipients are also not required to provide equal amounts of monetary assistance to each veteran enrolled in HVRP. Because services are tailored to each individual's needs, grant recipients have the flexibility to spend what is necessary to assist each veteran to overcome their employment barriers.

However, participant support costs must be reasonable and necessary to enable an individual to participate in HVRP, and overall spending for this cost category must be limited to the amounts set forth in the approved Budget Narrative. Some participant support costs also have a dollar limit per participant, a limitation on the amount of time that cost can be covered, or are only allowable for specific categories of veterans.

**Q2: How can I find local organizations that are already HVRP grant recipients?**

A2: External organizations interested in collaborating can identify an HVRP grant recipient near them utilizing the [list of PY25 HVRP grant recipients](#) on NVTAC's website. You can use the list to search for an HVRP by state, county, or Continuum of Care (CoC). It includes their contact information and their approved service delivery area (SDA).

**Q3: Is there a limit to the number of organizations that can receive HVRP grants per area (state, county, city, region)?**

A3: There is no limit to the number of HVRP grants allowed per area, especially if there are CoCs within the area that are undersaturated or lack HVRP representation entirely. However, the U.S. Department of Labor, Veterans' Employment and Training Service (DOL/VETS) is committed to developing an appropriate distribution of HVRP funds to serve the most veterans

experiencing or at risk of homelessness. Thus, DOL/VETS will consider the saturation levels of grant recipients versus the homeless veteran population in each geographical area to ensure services are within saturation limits.

DOL/VETS has an SDA Saturation Map of every CoC that HVRP grant recipients serve. The saturation level is calculated by dividing the total number of HVRP planned enrollments in the CoC by the most recent U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Point in Time (PIT) Count for the number of veterans experiencing homelessness. CoCs with saturation levels of 100 percent or more indicate that current HVRP grant recipients are already planning to enroll more participants than the estimated number of veterans experiencing homelessness for the CoC.

Q4: Does the SDA Saturation Map impact an organization's ability to be awarded an HVRP grant and/or the amount of the award? For example, are grant applications in low saturation areas given priority? Is DOL/VETS likely to approve an organization for HVRP funding if they apply for an area already served by existing HVRP grant recipients?

A4: As stated in the previous response, there is no limit to the amount of HVRP grants allowed per area, but DOL/VETS is committed to developing an appropriate distribution of HVRP funds to serve the most veterans experiencing or at risk of homelessness and will take saturation into account when making grant awards.

For example, in the Program Year (PY) 2026 HVRP Funding Opportunity Announcement (FOA), DOL/VETS looked at the applicant's proposed SDA's saturation levels and planned enrollments served by an active grant in the same CoC. Applicants proposing to serve a CoC with a saturation level of 120 percent or more had to justify the existence of unmet demand. Failure to provide justification for a saturation level of 120 percent or more for the CoCs where at least 50 percent of Planned Enrollments were allocated resulted in scoring zero points for the Expected Outcomes and Outputs criteria. In rare metropolitan geographic locations, the SDA may be undersaturated and may allow for multiple applications providing services in different parts of the SDA (e.g., the Eastside and San Fernando Valley of Los Angeles, or Queens and the Lower East Side of New York City).

Q5: The Department of Family Services (DFS) and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) are now requiring recipients to work, volunteer, or be enrolled in a job training program. Would HVRP qualify as one of these programs for the eligible veterans enrolled in HVRP?
